#### "Steve Liebenow Memorial Scholarship"

The Towanda Lions Club is sponsoring a **\$1000.00** scholarship for a 2015 High School college bound senior and/or currently enrolled college student attending classes full time from the Towanda area. This is a one-time scholarship not open to renewal.

Applicants for this scholarship must meet the following criteria:

- 1. The applicant must have a Towanda mailing residence address.
- 2. Average grade of C verified by a high school transcript.
- 3. In 250 words or less, submit a letter of application containing a brief biographical profile which includes your college plans, school activities, community service activities and work history. Indicate your plans for using the scholarship money and why you are deserving of the award.
- 4. Submit 2 letters of recommendation: one from a teacher, counselor or administrator, and one from a non-relative in the Towanda area.
- 5. Submit a copy of your fall 2015 class schedule of the college/university you will be attending.
- 6. Letter of application, recommendations, transcript, and class schedule must be received by the Scholarship Committee Chairman by September 15, 2015.

We talk about how fast the grass is growing and how often we need to mow it. Unfortunately, the weeds are growing just as fast. They are much easer to pull when they are small and the roots aren't so big. Also if you get rid of them before they go to seed, there won't be so many next year.

If you haven't put a cage around your tomatoes, you should do it now to help keep the plant off of the ground and it will be easier to pick the ripe tomatoes. It is also time to

place mulch around the tomato plant to help keep the roots cool and also to keep the moisture more even.

You can remove the foliage of the spring blooming bulbs as it yellows and dies, for both the looks and sanitation. Prune your evergreen hedge now so it can send out new growth before fall. When pruning your hedge, prune so the bottom is wider than the top, using an A shape. That way the bottom part can get more light and send out green shoots, making it more attractive.

Watch for insects feeding on the foliage, check to see what the insect is before you reach for insecticide. It could be a beneficial insect. Only about 10 percent of the insects are bad bugs. If you want to keep your evergreen trees and shrubs in shape, now is the time to trim the pine candles {new growth}. Stop harvesting asparagus in late June. Then fertilize it after the final harvest.



The month of June is when the apple, peach, and pear trees start their "fruit drop". In the spring they are so pretty with the pretty blossoms and they are loaded with flowers. There is no way the trees could handle that much fruit. The branches would all break. Some of the fruit just naturally falls off. If you did not remove any of the remaining, they would be small. I like a big, juicy apple or peach, so I remove a lot of the fruit now. It is best to thin the apple and peaches so that there is only one fruit every 6--9 inches

apart. I know you don't want to remove any, but by doing so you will have much nicer, and larger fruit.

Thinning the fruit will also be better for the tree. The tree would have to use so much energy to grow all of the fruit and then the next year, it wouldn't have enough energy to produce a good crop. That is why some trees that are not thinned only produce every other year.

With all the rain we have been having, be sure to check your outdoor containers to make sure the excess water is draining out. If there is too much water in the container, the roots can't get enough oxygen and they will rot and die.



With all the rain we have been having, the mosquitoes have a lot of places to raise a family. Be sure to get rid of as much standing water such as flower pot trays, tires, etc. as possible. There are "donuts" that you can put in your water garden to prevent mosquitoes.

Also, for years we have used products containing "deet" to repel the mosquitoes. Now we also have some more organic repellants, such as Cutter Advanced, containing "Picardin", Lemon Eucalyptus, and Natural Herbal Armor. I am sure there are probably more, but I know these

work for me. As always, follow the directions on the container.

I see the male Japanese beetles are starting to emerge. The females will soon follow. Twice a day, I take my small container of dish soap and water, usually morning and evening, hold it under the insect and touch the beetle on the back. It will fold it's legs, and fall into the water and drown. If you put a trap out for Japanese beetles, that will draw more of them to your yard and they will probably stop and eat on the way to the trap. Once they start eating, they send out an odor telling the others there is some good food here. The male and female will mate and around the first week in July, she will lay her many eggs. Do not water your lawn during that time, it will make it softer for her to lay her eggs into the soil. They usually stay around for about 6 weeks.

# Ecology Action Center Launches Public-Private Campaign for Locally Funded Household Hazardous Waste Collection Event, Building On Success of 2012 Effort

The Illinois Environmental Protection Agency recently stated that no funding is available from the State of Illinois for Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) collections in Illinois in the first half of 2015. However, the Ecology Action Center is pleased to announce the launch of a renewed fundraising effort to provide for a fall 2015 McLean County Household Hazardous Waste Collection. While local government partners including the City of Bloomington, Town of Normal, and McLean County are providing some of the funding required for the tentative HHW collection, the remaining funding will need to come from private contributions and sponsorships from the local community. Participation will be limited to McLean County residents. Illinois law mandates that only residential Household Hazardous Waste may be collected; business or industrial waste cannot be accepted.

HHW is any material or chemical that is toxic, flammable, corrosive, explosive, or reactive. McLean County residents once again will have the opportunity to safely dispose of pesticides, oil-based paints, mercury thermometers, old gasoline, cleaning products, insecticides, lawn chemicals, and other hazardous materials. When improperly tossed in the trash, dumped down a drain, or illegally discarded elsewhere, these waste products pollute our water supplies, compromise our drinking water, and threaten our health.


In the past, state-sponsored HHW collections were a legal, safe and reliable way of disposing of HHW in Illinois. Mclean County benefited from annual collection events from 2003 to 2007, with most of the costs paid by the IEPA. Unfortunately, budget cutbacks resulted in the loss of funding for this program for five years. In 2012, EAC decided that the community needed to take matters into its own hands and spearheaded a successful public/private partnership to raise the funds necessary for a McLean County HHW collection. In 2013, EAC received funding from the IEPA for a HHW collection.


The significant turnout at the 2012 and 2013 HHW events showed that McLean County residents need them on a more regular basis. But a one-day HHW collection is expensive and state funding is no longer reliable. Under a recent multi-year agreement, the City of Bloomington, the Town of Normal, and McLean County will provide a significant portion of the funding for HHW collections in 2015 and 2017. Private contributions are necessary for the remaining portion, so HHW collections will be possible only with strong community support.

The EAC is now soliciting donations to the McLean County HHW Fund for the fall 2015 HHW collection. The one-day event will cost an estimated \$180,000. The EAC is a registered 501(c)(3) non-profit organization; contributions to the HHW McLean Fund are tax-deductible to the extent allowable by law. Donations may be made online at HHWmclean.org or by mail.

The Ecology Action Center is a not-for-profit environmental agency with a mission to inspire and assist residents of McLean County in creating, strengthening and preserving a healthy environment. The EAC acts as a central resource for environmental education, information, outreach, and technical assistance in McLean County.
