# Indian Creek Flooding

The 4-5 inch rains we had July 8 and 9 on already saturated ground was more than the banks of Money Creek could hold. The photos below from Fred Walk show the flooding that occurred near and surrounding the creek.

The lilies are really pretty this year. You can add them to an arrangement, or use then alone. As soon as you bring them into the house, cut an inch or so off of the stem. Use a sharp knife and make a diagonal cut so it can have more surface to absorb water. Remove all leaves that could be under water.. The submerged leaves can produce a bacteria that will shorten the vase life of the flowers.

As the blossoms wither and the leaves turn yellow, remove them. Change the water every few days. With all the rain and the cool nights, we are seeing more powdery mildew on the plants this year, especially phlox, lilac, cone flower, and bee balm. If the leaves turn brown, you can remove them and destroy, not compost, them. It should go away once the sun shines more and they have better air circulation. It should not kill the plants, just takes away from their pretty beauty.

We don't hear a lot about using coca-bean mulch. It is a good, attractive, sweet chocolate smelling mulch, but it can be dangerous for your dog. Chocolate contains a compound that is toxic to dogs.



With all the rain we have been getting, the plants are beginning to show they have had enough. The lower leaves on some plants are turning yellow. The roots of the plats need to be able to get air and oxygen to breathe, the ground is so full of water that they can't breathe and the roots will rot if it lasts too long. If possible, try to drain the water away. If the pot has a saucer under it, be sure to empty it right after the rain stops. If needed, you could pull the mulch back from the plant,

so the soil can dry faster.

One good thing about the rain, it is easier to pull the weeds. Creeping Charlie has been sending out runners, some 2-3 feet long. It is time for it to start developing roots. At each place there is a leaf, the plant will send a bunch of roots down into the ground. If it is creeping into your flower bed, now is a good time to pull a lot of it out. Each plant could have 4 or 5 runners and a lot of leaves.

The garden centers are having sales now, it is a good time to go shopping. Sometimes the plants in containers don't look the best; broken stems etc., but once you get them into the ground, they will perk up and start to grow.

We have more visitors to our garden than just the pollinators. There are bats, mostly the little brown bat, that are flying mammals who cruise thru the neighborhood trying to control beetles, moths and mosquitoes. They come out about dusk. Bats do not build nests, they live in attics, wall space, basements, chimneys and under siding. They roost in hollow trees, under the bark of trees and in caves. Their young are born in May to July and are weaned in July to August.

Toads, frogs, and salamanders feed on insects, snails and worms. They live under rocks, decaying logs and fallen leaves. Don't be so neat, and leave some leaves for them to live under.

Dragonflies can be in a range of colors. They are voracious eaters of insects and mosquitoes. They lay their eggs in water, so watch for them around your pond. They like to stay near the water and watch for prey and are interesting to watch.
