Now that it is cold outside, the birds are not finding insects to eat. It is time to put out suet cakes so they can get some protein to help keep them warm. Also it is good to keep some bird seed in the feeders. They like to eat late in the afternoon to hold them over for the night. The birds also like a place out of the cold winter winds. A lot of the pretty song birds have gone to warmer places. We still see a lot of sparrows, we need to feed them thru the winter so they will be here to eat the insects next spring.

If you have some tall, narrow trees, such as the Arborvitae, you could wrap a rope around it so when we have ice or heavy, wet snow, it won't split. Sometimes they have more than one trunk, and by wrapping around them up about 6 feet or more will prevent them from falling over and breaking.

Also if you have some young fruit or ornamental trees, place some tree wrap around the trunk. In January, when the sun is warm the tree could think it is spring and send some water up the trunk. Then after the sun goes down, the temperature drops faster than the water in the trunk. The water can freeze and cause a crack in the bark of the tree. In early spring, remove the wrap so the insects don't make a home there.

You can cut some of the older stems from your red twig and yellow twig dogwood to use in your winter arrangement. You need to remove older stems every few years because the younger growth produce the most color.

If you have not planted your hyacinth bulbs in the ground yet, you could try to force them to bloom indoors. They are easy to force, but you do need to have some patience. Fill a pot with damp soil up to about 4 inches from the rim. Place the bulbs, with the tips facing up, close together, but not touching. Add more soil, but be sure the tips barely show. Place the pot in the refrigerator for 6-8 weeks. Mark the date on the pot or calendar. They need to chill before they will grow and bloom. When you remove them from the fridge, water and place them in a semi-dark place for a week so the shoots can turn green and grow. Then place them in a cool bright spot. Remember they are used to cool air. You should see blooms in 3-4 weeks.

Avoid mulching the perennials until after the ground freezes. Remove the rotten fruit and debris from around fruit trees.

Stop fertilizing your house plants, unless they get supplemental light. They rest during the shorter light days of winter. You could provide extra humidity for house plants.

It is the time to look for that fresh cut Christmas tree. A few things to think about before you go. After you have decided where you are going to put the tree, check to make sure there is enough space. Measure to see how high it is to the ceiling. Take a tape measure to check how tall the tree is. Looks bigger when you get it in the house. Bundle up good and go find that perfect tree. If you can't place it in the house the same day, place it in a bucket of water and in a place out of the wind.

Place a tree bag on the floor, so you can pull it up around the tree when you take it out and not drop needles all over the floor. Have water in the tree stand and cut about 1-2 inches off the trunk. You want a fresh cut so the tree can absorb the water. It will use a lot of water the first few days. Be

sure that there is always plenty of water at all times. The cut will heal over if not kept under water. Try to cover the tree stand so the cat and dog can not drink the water.

If you are planning on a live tree, dig the hole before the ground freezes. Place the soil in a place where the soil won't freeze when you plant the tree. Cover the hole with a board. Remember the root ball is large and heavy. Don't keep the tree inside for more than 2-4 days. You don't want it to think it is spring. Water it deeply after you plant it outside. You want a fresh cut so the tree can absorb the water. It will use a lot of water the first few days. Be sure that there is always plenty of water at all times. The cut will heal over if not kept under water. Try to cover the tree stand so the cat and dog can not drink the water.
